
PROGRAM UPDATES



Work has begun on a new Arts Build Communities (ABC) project, which addresses a community need or issue through the arts. ABC grants are funded through the Iowa Arts Council, with additional resources provided by the University of Iowa, Iowa State University, and the University of Northern Iowa. This year the University of Iowa is working with River Music Experience in Davenport and with other

Quad City organizations and individuals to capitalize on the vibrant live-music scene in order to promote economic growth.

Jessica Pleyel, a graduate student in the School of Art & Art History, taught performance art workshops at Welsh Elementary School in Williamsburg and Grant Wood Elementary in Iowa City. Successful partnerships bring together community members from diverse backgrounds to collaborate with UI faculty, students, and staff.

ABOUT IISC: We are a campus-wide engaged learning program at the University of Iowa that partners with communities and groups across Iowa to develop projects that university students and faculty can complete through their academic and research activities. Since our development in

2009, we have had 16 community partnerships across the state, and have completed over 140 projects that have contributed significantly to the advancement of our partnering communities' economic, social, and environmental sustainability. Over the past years, we have been inspired and invigorated by the success that our university and community partnerships have achieved. Infrastructure planning and design is important for economic development and sustainable growth in communities. Next spring, the Department of Civil & Environmental Engineering, College of Engineering will work on 12 infrastructure projects across Iowa in partnership with the RC&Ds, such as Golden Hills RC&D in southwest Iowa and Pathfinders RC&D in southeast Iowa. A sample of proposed projects include a trail plan to connect an existing in-town trail system in Red Oak to the community's levy; redesigning the Iowa School for the Deaf's natural area in Council Bluffs; a downtown building rehabilitation analysis and design in Eldon, Iowa; and a scenic overlook site development and design along the Historic Hills Scenic Byway in Van Buren County. UI professor Paul Hanley will serve as faculty advisor for all projects.
